

Intro to 4-H

4-H is a youth-led program that exists in over 80 different Countries! In 4-H, young people make new friends, develop new skills, become leaders and help shape their communities, country and world. The Garfield County 4-H program began in 1916 in Rifle with just a few clubs. Today we have 224-H Clubs and 3 advisory 4-H Councils.!

What do the 4 H's stand for?



Head We learn new skills and information to use in every day life. New information comes from leaders, fellow members, and new experiences.

Heart Through 4-H participation, members are always developing their sense of identity and defining their personal values. Making connections with others and gaining social skills is another big part of this program.

Hands 4-H takes a hands-on approach to learning through project work and community service. Members learn more about what they like to do and how to help others.

Health Personal responsibility is a part of our code of conduct and should inspire members to care for their own physical and mental health. They are encouraged to make choices that have a positive impact on their well-being.





4-H Clubs

When you joined 4-H, you signed up to be part of a community club. This club is a group of 4-H Families who meet once a month from October to September to learn and have fun. Clubs usually do community service together and sometimes fund raise to purchase club shirts or pay for activities.

Club Meetings

Each club has at least one adult leader, but club meetings are led by elected youth officers. Most clubs have their officers elected for the year by January. The club bylaws will stipulate the requirements for youth who want to run for these positions, or you can just ask your club leader!

All club meetings should follow Parliamentary Procedure as outlines in Robert's Rules of Order to make decisions and run discussions.

This means that most of your club meetings will follow this agenda style:

- Call meeting to order
- Pledges
 - American
 - 4-H Pledge
- Reading/Approval of the Minutes
- Treasurer's Report
- Old/Unfinished Business
- New Business
- Announcements
- Adjourn
- Demonstrations, talks, refreshments, and recreation



Basic Parliamentary Procedure

When your club needs to make a decision, Parlimentary procedure will help make sure everyone is heard and all ideas are considered. You can learn more about how Parli Pro runs a meeting at https://bit.ly/Parlimentary

Here is an example of how to use basic Parli Pro.

President: We need a motion to decide our next fundraiser.

Rose: Madame President

President: Yes Rose?

Rose: I move to sell butter braids for our next fundraiser.

Sam: I second that motion

President: It has been properly moved and seconded that we sell butter braids for the fundraiser. Is there any discussion?

is on the floor.)

Steve: We sold butter braids last year and many people asked if we had other options. We might need to sell something else along with them, like cookie dough.

(If someone agrees with Steve, they can amend the motion)

Sara: Madame President

President: Yes Sara?

Sara: I move to amend the motion by adding cookie dough to what we will sell

Steve: I second that

President: It has been moved and seconded to amend the motion by adding cookie dough to what we will sell. Is there any discussion?

Hearing none, we will vote on the amendment. All in favor, say aye. All opposed, give the same sign. (All YOUTH members of the club may vote except for the president.)

The motion is amended.



Is there other discussion on the main motion?

Hearing none, we will vote on the motion to sell butter braids and cookie dough for our fundraiser. All in favor, say aye. All opposed, give the same sign.

The motion passes.














The 4-H Pledge



How to Grow in 4-H

In 4-H, we learn by doing! Youth learn useful skills, teamwork, and how to serve their community and country. Here are some of the activities you will do to grow this year!

- Project Work: Choose at least one project to complete based on your interests. Complete the recordbook associated with your project.
- Demonstrations: Share something you have learned with your club
- Recreation: Attend county events, play games, make new friends!
- Community Service: Complete at least 6 hours of community service with your club or at other 4-H events.
- Contests: You may enter optional contests like Cake Decorating, Creative
 Cooks, Fashion Review, Premier Exhibitor, or County Shoot.
- Exhibits: Show off your project work at county fair and learn from your judge.
- Events: You may participate in day camps, Livestock Expo, workshops,
 District Retreat, or State Conferences to learn more!



4-H Project Work


For the most part, project work is self-paced and individual. The project(s) you choose should reflect your interests, but the subject is much less important than the process of completing your work! Each project area has different requirements, but you will always have opportunities to Robotics Record develop life skills.

Project work is a process. This year you will:

- Select your project(s)
- Download the record book (e-record) for your project and age group at https://co4h.colostate.edu/programareas/colorado-4-h-project-information/
- - Get any project manuals you need from the extension office
 - Set goals
 - Attend club meetings
 - Attend any project meetings and/or workshops
 - Accomplish goals
 - Keep good records
 - Demonstrate what you've learned
 - And tell your story through your project record book!

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Cloverbuds

Cloverbuds is a project reserved for children aged 5-7. It is designed help our youngest members explore the different areas of 4-H before committing to a specific project area when they turn 8!

Our cloverbuds meet once a month at the Fairgrounds to do fun activities and experiements with their leader and parents. Parents or guardians are required to attend with their cloverbuds.

These young members have the opportunity to participate in all 4-H events and may join a community club if they choose to! While cloverbuds are invited to explore all project areas, they are not able to participate in shooting sports, horse, or livestock projects until they turn 8.



During the year, cloverbuds complete quite a few crafts and learning opportunities. If they want to present one of these at fair we are happy to give them time to meet with a judge! Grab a cloverbud practice-recordbook from the Extension Office to get the full experience.







County Fair

One of the highlights of the year for 4-H members is being able to exhibit their work or animals in the Garfield County Fair to complete their projects. Members will exhibit in horse, dog, livestock, general projects, shooting sports, and/or county contests. Any Garfield County 4-H member in good standing who meets the enrollment, attendance and tagging/weigh in deadlines can participate.

- Our County Fair is held at the end of July each year at the Fairgrounds in Rifle and is preceded by County Shoot 3 weekends before, and Dog, County Contests, and Horse fair the week before.
- Animal Uploads are due on 4-HOnline before fair. Due dates are set in the Livestock Rulebook. (See page 18)
- Individuals will enter their fair projects online through FairEntry.com by July 1. Instructions can be found here:

 http://co4h.colostate.edu/fairentry/documents/manage/family-helpsheet.pdf
- General projects (non-livestock projects), shooting sports and cloverbuds will bring their project and record book to the Fairgrounds on the Saturday before Fair for judging interviews at a pre-scheduled time.
- Each 4-H member will have time to sit down with their judge to talk about their exhibit. All exhibits will be displayed for the public all week and must be picked up on the last Sunday of Fair. Any exhibits/projects left become the property of Garfield County 4-H.
- Livestock projects are required to check in for vet checks, weigh in, and stalling at the beginning of fair week. Please see the Livestock Rulebook for the calendar, specific times of vet check, weigh-in, and shows!

Junior Livestock Sale


One livestock animal per exhibitor (or 1 in two different species) may be sold in the Garfield County Junior Livestock Sale. The auction takes place at 1pm on the Saturday at the end of fair week.

We are very fortunate to show in a county that loves to support 4-H by showing up and buying animals at the fair. Everyone you meet throughout the year is a potential buyer, so it is important to uphold the 4-H Code of Conduct wherever you go- you are always

making first impressions!

Networking with potential buyers can be intimidating, but just be yourself and let everyone know that you have an animal to sell and invite them to attend the sale! Every year, we hold a buyers luncheon before the sale. This will be another great place to socialize and network!



<u>BUY BACK:</u> During fair, you will hear about Buy-Back. This is a system to make a buyer's job easier. THIS IS NOT a means for youth to buy their own animal back after the sale! Each year, we have a buy-back buyer (BBB) who will pay a set-price for 4-H animals. Buyers not wanting to keep their purchased animal may pay the difference between the final sale price and this rate and give the animal to the BBB.

Livestock Uploads

If you are raising animals for fair (horse, dog, and livestock) you will need to upload them on 4HOnline by the deadline. These uploads provide the office with everything we need to verify your project animal when it comes time for fair. No animals may be entered in the fair without a 4HOnline upload.

You will need:

- Brand inspections in the youth exhibitor's name (Beef only)
- Bill of sale (document showing that the animal is OWNED BY THE YOUTH, not the parents)
- · Pictures of your animal
- A picture of your animal with you

If you are entering the livestock "Producer" class at fair, you will also need to do a SEPARATE upload of the produced animal's mother uploaded as a "breeding" animal with a picture of the mama animal with the exhibitor.

Reminder that the mama animal must be owned by the exhibitor or immediate family as specified in the livestock rulebook.

Re-Enrollment and Volunteering

So you made it through your first year of 4-H- Great job! Once you have taken some time to recover from fair and state fair, a few things will happen:

- If you turned in a livestock, horse, or dog recordbook, the judge will send it back to the Extension Office with a score and comments.
- Achievement Night! Achievement night usually happens within the first week
 of October. It is a night to celebrate the new 4-H year and for 4-H Council to
 give out record book awards, outstanding member awards, volunteer awards,
 and member gifts! Make sure to attend as you will receive a wrap-up packet made
 just for you!
- Re-enrollment season opens the first week of October!

October 1-31: \$25 November 1-December 31: \$35 After January 1: \$45 Re-enrolling in 4-H early means that you will get a discount on your membership fee! Re-enrolling late will have an additional fee.

To start the process, log into your 4-HOnline account and click "Member List" on the left-hand bar. Next to each member's name, you will see a blue link that says "Enroll Now". Click there and follow the process through while making sure you update contact information and signatures. As always, membership fees may be paid by cahs check in person or by mail to the Extension Office and we usually have a credit card option as well!

The next step is to make an account on co.4-HOnline.com

If you already have a family account, just click the big blue "Add Member" button to add yourself as a volunteer! There is NO FEE for volunteers, but you will be required to submit three non-family references, complete a very short training, and submit a background check after enrolling to become approved. Supplemental volunteer trainings are held at least twice a year.

Volunteering with 4-H allows you to chaperone trips, participate more fully in 4-H Events and add more commuity service to you resume. Join us today, we'd love to have you!
